This introduction to policing provides the student with a sociological framework in which to examine important issues in both the history and development of policing, security and surveillance in North America. The focus will largely be on how policing is contextualized within society, with the State setting parameters within which policing occurs. Private policing will also be addressed.

## COURSE REQUIREMENTS - GRADING

The final grade will reflect your performance on three evaluation components of the course. These are:

## (1) Surprise Quizzes (20 points)

During the class, and at any time, your Course Director will quiz your knowledge of the assigned readings and your lecture material. You can expect four (4) quizzes to be held during the semester. They are multiple choice quizzes, each worth up to 5 points.

## (2) Midterm (30 points)

There will be an in-class, written midterm reflecting both your readings and lectures to this mid-point of the class. The questions will be narrative in style, not multiple choice, and will require you to apply your knowledge gained in class to one or more fact situations.

## (3) Final Exam (50 points)

There will be a final exam reflecting both your readings and lectures for the entire semester. The questions will be narrative in style, not multiple choice, and will require you to apply your knowledge gained in class to one or more fact situations. The final examination will be three (3) hours long and will be held in the final examination period, to be announced.
