Articles

Articles (a, an, and the) show whether a noun is specific or unspecific. 'The' is used to indicate a noun that is specific, while 'a' (or 'an') is used to indicate a noun that is unspecific.

Type of Article	Examples Involving Singular	Meaning
	Nouns	
Definite	Sally wants to eat the bun .	Sally wants to eat a specific bun.
Indefinite	Sally wants to eat a bun .	Sally wants to eat any bun.

Additionally, **no article** is necessary when describing a plural subject that is unspecific and usually when an abstract idea or concept is being introduced.

Type of Article	Example Involving Plural Nouns	Meaning
Definite & Plural	Sally wants to eat the buns .	Sally wants to eat many specific buns.
Indefinite &	Sally wants to eat buns .	Sally wants to eat more than one bun, but
Plural (No Article)		not any specific buns.
Abstract Concept	Sally values honesty .	Honesty, an abstract concept, is
(No Article)		important to Sally.
