

DISABILITY STUDIES – MODULE CHECKLIST

(Revised July 2016 – effective September 1, 2016)

Major in Disability Studies

Admission Requirements:

- Completion of first-year requirements, including Disability Studies 1010A/B *Exploring Disability*, or the former Interdisciplinary Studies 1010A/B, with a minimum grade of 60%.

Module: (6.0 courses)

- 1.0 course:**
Disability Studies 2201F/G (or the former DS 2201A/B) *Rethinking Disability*, 2202A/B *Understanding Disability Labels*, or the former IS 2246
- 5.0 courses:** to be taken from Groups A and/or B as listed below. Students must take at least 2.5 courses from Group A (Note: students may take and count as many group A courses as they want; up to the full 5.0). Students must have at least 1.0 total 3000 level or above courses; of which at least 0.5 must be from Group A.

Group A: Includes any Disability Studies course (including Special topics; excluding 1010A/B, 2201F/G, 2202A/B)

- At least 2.0 Disability Studies Courses from Level 2000 or above

- At least 0.5 Disability Studies course(s) from level 3000 or above

Group B: Courses from approved list below or others by special permission of DS Coordinator.

*Students can always substitute additional Group A (DS) credits in place of Group B

- Maximum of 2.0 total courses from the Approved List

- 0.5 course at the 3000 level or above from the approved list if the student only has 0.5 3000 level from Group A

Admission Requirements:

Module: (4.0 courses)

- 1.0 course:**
Disability Studies 2201F/G (or the former DS 2201A/B) *Rethinking Disability*, 2202A/B *Understanding Disability Labels*, or the former IS 2246
- 3.0 courses:** To be taken from Groups A and/or B as listed below. Students must take at least 1.5 courses from Group A, and up to a maximum of 1.5 from group B. (Note: students may take and count as many group A courses as they want; up to the full 3.0).

Group A: Includes any Disability Studies courses (including Special topics; excluding 1010A/B, 2201F/G, 2202A/B)

- At least 1.5 Disability Studies courses from level 2000 or above:**

Group B: Courses in approved list below or others by special permission of DS Coordinator.

- A maximum of 1.5 courses from the Approved List:**
*Note: Students can always substitute additional Group A (DS) courses in place of Group B ones
