Dr. Broad teaches Canadian history (with a particular emphasis on intellectual history), war and society studies, and historical theory and methods. In addition to being a member of the Department of History, Dr. Broad helped to design and teaches in the King's Foundation in Western Thought and Civilization program. Dr. Broad recently published *One in a Thousand: The Life and Death of Captain Eddie McKay, Royal Flying Corps*. In 2014 he released *A Small Price to Pay: Consumer Culture on the Canadian Home Front, 1939-45*. He is an active social commentator on Twitter @ProfessorBroad.
