# First year requirements

Students are required to take 5.0 Year 1 courses

Your courses should include the following:

- At least 4 different subjects with no more than 2.0 credits in the same subject
- 1.0 course from each of two of Categories A, B, or C
- We encourage you to take an Essay Course in your first year
- Students are permitted to count up to 7.0 Year 1 courses towards their degree



### Breadth requirements

Students are required to complete 1.0 credit in each of the following categories:

- Category A (Social Science)
- Category B (Arts and Humanities)
- Category C (Science)

### Essay requirements



Students are required to complete 2.0 essay credits with at least 1.0 credit at the 2000-level or above

Essay course suffixes:

F = 0.5 first-term essay course

G = 0.5 second-term essay course

E = 1.0 full-year essay course

## Check your adjudication comments



Adjudication is the process by which your academic record is reviewed to determine your eligibility to enter, or to stay, in your chosen module(s). This occurs every May and then again in August for students who took a summer course. Once you have been adjudicated, your grade report will be available on Student Center.

To check your grade report on the Student Center, go to: Academics > Program Status > Grade Report - Progression



• ENSURE A TOTAL OF 1.0 COURSE FROM CATEGORY C IS COMPLETED

This means the student is eligible to progress in the module(s)/program they requested on their ITR. The student is reminded that they still require the Category C breadth requirements, which can be found in the Academic Calendar. The breadth requirements do not need to be completed immediately, it is simply a reminder that it needs to be done before graduation.

### Types of Modules



Honours Specialization 9.0 to 12.0 credits

Major 6.0 to 7.0 credits

Specialization 9.0 credits

Minor 4.0 to 5.0 credits



### Degree Types

## The Honours Bachelor Degree (20.0 Courses)

15.0 courses after first year, including at least an Honours Specialization or a Double Major, as follows:

- Honours Specialization module (9.0 or more)
  This may be combined with a Major module or a Minor module
- Major module (6.0 7.0) plus a Major module (6.0 7.0) This combination requires two Major modules.



### Degree Types

The Honours Bachelor Degree

- Minimum modular average of 70%
- Minimum cumulative average of 65%
- Minimum grade of 60 in each course of the module
- No fails



# Degree Types 4-Year Bachelor of Arts (20.0 Courses)

15.0 courses after first year including at least a Specialization module or a Major module, as follows:

- Specialization module (9.0 or more)
  This may be combined with a Major module or a Minor module
- Major module (6.0 7.0) plus a Major module (6.0 7.0)
- Major module (6.0 -7.0) plus Minor(s) modules(s)
- Major module (6.0 7.0)



# Degree Types 3-Year Bachelor of Arts (15.0 Courses)

10.0 courses after first year including at least a Major module or Double Minors, as follows:

- Major module (6.0 7.0)
- Major module (6.0 7.0) plus a Minor module (4.0 5.0)
- Minor module (4.0 5.0) plus a Minor module (4.0 5.0)



### Degree Types

4-Year BA and 3-Year BA

- Minimum modular average of 60%
- Minimum cumulative average of 60%

### Electives




 Electives are your option courses that make up the rest of your degree beyond your Year 1 and modular requirements

 We encourage you to explore subject areas outside of your primary module(s) when choosing your electives.


 You may also need to fulfill category requirements (e.g. Category C) within your elective courses

### CHECK FOR ANTIREQS



Make sure you haven't taken any antirequisite courses. If you have, you will lose credit for the first course taken.

### CHECK YOUR YEAR 1 COURSES



Make sure you aren't exceeding 7.0 courses at the 1000-level. Courses taken above and beyond 7.0 will be extraneous to your degree.

#### COURSES IN THE SAME SUBJECT AREA



Max 14.0 courses in the same subject area (Honours BA, 4–Year BA) Max 9.0 courses in the same subject area (3–Year BA)
