It was such a great experience, I ended up continuing on as a volunteer till today. This is my 8th year with the LIPC and I have loved watching our campers grow into counsellors and team leads. I feel blessed to watch our little campers learn so much, especially in my favourite activity, the Friday scavenger hunt! Each year I learn about other faiths, but also my own faith. I am excited to make the LIPC a part of our family tradition.
