Celebrating Rosh Hashanah



Hello Peace Campers and Families! Maija asked me to write a bit about how the recently ended Jewish High Holy Days played out during this year of Covid-19. After spending so much time with all of you on Zoom this summer, it probably won't surprise you to learn that in spite of desperately wanting to be together with our synagogue's members, family, and friends. We, at Temple Israel, were forced to take the safe path and pray and "meet" together on small screens during this most important time on the Jewish calendar. The year 5781 on the Jewish calendar, which traditionally counts years from the Creation of the World, begins with Rosh Hashanah which literally means the "Head of the Year" but usually translates as Jewish New Year. This year, it began on the evening of Friday, September 18th and nothing - not a pandemic, not a hurricane (and there was a famous one in 1900 right before Rosh Hashanah in Galveston, Texas, which killed 6,000 to 10,000 people,) not anything else - can change this timing. You can't just postpone it until the next spring or cancel it like an award ceremony or a baseball or theatre season. Rabbi Debra and a committee at Temple Israel began making alternative plans as soon as it became obvious that in-person religious services would not be possible this year, even six months in the future. Our congregation consists of about 120 families and includes many older people and even if our government had not banned large gatherings, our many older members would have faced serious health risks had we met in person to pray.

So, just like the Peace Camp organizers, we spent countless hours reimagining how to provide meaningful services and observances. It was decided early on to pre-record our choir's beautiful melodies, one voice at a time, and merge them together with software. As a long-time choir member, I can say that this year, I rather enjoyed how much more relaxing it was just to be able to be an ordinary congregant when it was time for the musical portions of the services.

Celebrating Rosh Hashanah



Rabbi Debra also asked me if my family and I would read the Torah portion in Hebrew and chant the blessings surrounding these readings. It was a great honour that my wife and I and our children and grandchildren in both London and Los Angeles were able to make those video recordings. In all, it was a very different way to observe these most important of the Jewish Holy Days but not necessarily a less than ideal way. As an added bonus, it also allowed people who would normally be shut-ins to attend, another benefit of virtual services.

Each of our services requires a prayer book so several days before Rosh Hashanah were set aside for members to drive to Temple Israel, properly masked, to pick up the books, called Machzorim. In addition, each family received a traditional round challah and a bottle of apple cider, flavoured with honey, since apples and honey are traditionally eaten together at this season to symbolize a sweet New Year. This was another lovely unexpected benefit. Thank you, Rabbi Debra, for providing these treats.

In summary, would we have chosen this way to welcome the New Year? Probably not. But did it work out well? I think many would agree that it did. We pray that next year will not still require services via Zoom and FaceBook but if they are necessary, we are going to be ready. Peace, Salaam, Shalom. *Written by Walter Zimmerman.
